Assisting Individuals in Crisis & Group Crisis Intervention (GRIN)

3 Day Course: 9/13-15/2026

Many consider this foundational course to be essential in understanding and responding to stress and trauma

Course Description: This 3-day course combines ALL of the content of ICISF's Assisting Individuals in Crisis AND Group Crisis Intervention courses.

Crisis Intervention is NOT psychotherapy; rather, it is a specialized acute emergency mental health intervention which requires specialized training. As physical first aid is to surgery, crisis intervention is to psychotherapy. Thus, crisis intervention is sometimes called "emotional first aid." Designed to present the core elements of a comprehensive, systematic and multi-component crisis intervention curriculum, this course will prepare participants to understand a wide range of crisis intervention services for both the individual and for groups. Fundamentals of Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) will be outlined and participants will leave with the knowledge and tools to provide several group crisis interventions, specifically demobilizations, defusings and the Critical Incident Stress Debriefing (CISD). The need for appropriate follow-up services and referrals, when necessary, will also be discussed.

The Simulated Debriefing scheduled for Monday night is a mandatory component of this course. Your attendance is vital to demonstrate understanding and engagement with the course materials.

This course is designed for anyone in the fields of Business & Industry Crisis Intervention, Disaster Response, Education, Emergency Services, Employee Assistance, Healthcare, Homeland Security, Mental Health, Military, Spiritual Care, and Traumatic Stress. Qualifies for 27 Contact Hours.

Understanding the First Responder's Cultures: For Mental Health Staff

One Day Class: 9/13/2026

Course Description:

All Mental Health professionals know that we need to understand the cultural setting of our clients to provide the most effective interventions. This is also true for working with First Responder's. For the purposes of this training, First Responder's are identified as those individuals who work as: Dispatchers, Law Enforcement Officers, Correctional Officers, Firefighters, and Emergency Medical personnel.

There are some issues/stressors that cut across all of these professions, but also some that are more unique to the specific group. This course identifies the cultures of each profession and their unique stressors. The various CISM courses teach a variety of group approaches to crisis intervention, but what about the follow-up if an individual comes to us for assistance not related to a Critical Incident? First Responder's can have a variety of life issues including marital problems, family issues, depression, substance abuse struggles, PTSD, etc. We need to understand the unique stress of their professions and how those might impact their non-professional lives in order to offer the most effective help.

This class will provide information about first responders' cultures and opportunities for discussion regarding adapting our clinical approach to meet the needs of first responders. Qualifies for 7 Contact Hours.

There is no “quick fix” in this program. It is not designed to be a “pop psych” feel-good course. Rather, this course contains facts and specific suggestions for actions you can take to enhance your personal resilience, all based upon the latest and most credible science. Rationale For Presentation:

There is a need to better prepare emergency responders and their loved ones in dealing with the natural biological process that occurs from adrenaline dumps and the resulting consequences of the cumulative exposures to trauma, stress, tragedy and grief. Emergency responders along with their loved ones and support systems will learn realistic and positive ways to manage the unique challenges and pitfalls that occur while on the job while also understanding the differences between depression, post-traumatic stress, PTSD and normal recovery time behaviors.

Cognitive Objectives:

- **Discuss and understand the daily environmental stressors and its effects;**
- **Discuss and understand the physiological and psychological changes that take place in a responder's day and over a career;**
- **Discuss and gain knowledge of the natural biological process of the adrenaline rush and dump and why it is imperative that responders manage it;**
- **Discuss and understand what hyper-vigilance is and why it is essential for survival;**
- **Discuss and recognize the warning signs of individual and relationship destruction, depression, post-traumatic stress, PTSD and suicide;**

Advanced Assisting Individuals in Crisis

Two Day Class: 9/14-15/2026

Course Description:

Most psychological crisis intervention is done one person to one person, rather than in groups. These interactions may be face-to-face (in person or electronically), telephonic, via email, or even via text messaging. The SAFER-R model of individual psychological crisis intervention was developed to serve as a simple protocol or procedural guide to aid in conducting such individual psychological crisis interventions.

This two-day course builds upon, and is the logical continuation of, the basic ASSISTING INDIVIDUALS IN CRISIS course. Using the SAFER-R framework as a platform, participants are introduced to scenario-based variations of the model. Topics such as advanced psychological triage, grief, suicide intervention, challenges in follow up and referral, and self-care are addressed. In addition, participants are asked to evaluate pre-recorded video examples of crisis intervention using the SAFER-R model. Qualifies for 13 Contact Hours.

Advanced Group Crisis Intervention Two Day Class: 9/14-15/2026

Course Description:

Designed to provide participants with the latest information on critical incident stress management techniques and post-trauma syndromes, the Advanced Group Crisis Intervention builds on the knowledge base which was obtained through the Group Crisis Intervention course and/or in publications. At the conclusion of this course, participants will have been exposed to specific, proven strategies to intervene with those suffering the ill effects of their exposure to trauma. Emphasis will be on advanced defusings and debriefings in complex situations.

This course is designed for EAP, human resources and public safety personnel, mental health professionals, chaplains, emergency medical services providers, firefighters, physicians, police officers, nurses, dispatchers, airline personnel and disaster workers who are already trained in the critical incident stress debriefing format. It will also be useful for those working extensively with traumatized victims for various walks of life. This course requires previous training and experience. Qualifies for 14 Contact Hours.

Today we see an unprecedented mix of unique stressors & disasters with limited psychological resources. The Critical Incident Stress Management continuum offers high risk populations seeking a strategic crisis response; one that holistically builds the resilience of those in need.

Crisis Informed Peer Para-Counseling (CIPPC) expands the support tools of peer counselors to collectively cope with trauma and disasters. CIPPC will become the 1:1 follow up service to them CISD. The unprecedented mix of unique stressors & disasters with limited psychological resources means at risk populations are seeking a strategic crisis response; one that holistically builds the resilience of those in need and expands the support tools of peer counselors to collectively cope with trauma. Qualifies for 14 Contact Hours.

**Pastoral Crisis Intervention:
Psychological and Faith Based Crisis Intervention**

Two Day Class: 9/14-15/2026

Course Description:

PCI may be thought of as the practice of psychological crisis intervention within a spiritual/religious context. The purpose is NOT to teach theology. This is an “entry-level” class. It is assumed that attendees have NOT had SAFER-R PFA training previously! Qualifies for 13 Contact Hours.

Harold Love served 25 years with the Michigan State Police (MSP), before retiring as a captain in 2013. During his tenure as captain, he served as commander of the 2nd District, comprised of over 350 personnel working at multiple work sites and multi-jurisdictional special enforcement teams covering 6 counties in Southeast Michigan. Throughout his career, he served in different capacities at worksites throughout southern lower Michigan, developing a reputation as a trusted leader among public safety, community, and private sector partners.

Love is a national board certified fully licensed professional counselor (LPC). He is founder of Harold J. Love & Associates, which provides mental health and wellness services to public safety professionals as well as members of the general public. His team currently provides services to over 50 police and fire departments and university and hospital public safety divisions throughout southeast Michigan.
